Quick Guide to Comma Rules

Use a comma with:

- 1. Independent clauses when used with and, but, for, nor, so, yet **Example:** The game was over, but the crowd refused to leave.
- 2. Introductory words, clauses, or phrases **Example:** While I was eating, the cat scratched at the door.
- 3. Non-essential words, clauses, or phrases

 Example: This restaurant has an exciting atmosphere. The food, on the other hand, is rather bland.
- 4. Three or more words, clauses, or phrases written in a series **Example**: The Constitution establishes the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of government.
- 5. Two or more adjectives that describe the same noun **Example:** He was a difficult, stubborn child.
- 6. Contrasted coordinate elements near the end of a sentence **Example**: He was merely ignorant, not stupid.
- 7. Phrases at the end of the sentence that refer to the beginning or middle of the sentence

 Example: Nancy waved enthusiastically at the docking ship, laughing joyously.
- 8. Geographical names, items in dates, addresses, and titles in names.

Example: Rachel B. Lake, MD, will be the principal speaker.

9. Quotation

Example: John said without emotion, "I'll see you tomorrow."

10. Wherever necessary to prevent confusion or misreading **Example:** To George, Harrison had been a sort of idol.
